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## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2017

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 September 2017. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### History

The Karen Hilltribes Trust was first registered as a charity in 1989 to address the lack of clean water in Karen villages, under the name Mae Phon Karen Hill Tribes Trust (Charity number 800796). The charity was formed through a partnership with current Karen Manager Salahae and a British Expat working in Thailand. By working with Karen communities, clean water systems were designed and put in place to provide a source of life changing access to clean water. In response to the expressed needs of the Karen, the work of KHT has now expanded into the areas of food security and education with the aim to support the Karen in building a more sustainable future.

To aid this mission, a strong link with the UK was formed. This has resulted in over 400 volunteers travelling to Thailand to help construct clean water systems and teach English in Karen schools. In 1999, a fundraising office was opened in York and the charity was re-registered under the name The Karen Hilltribes Trust in 2002 by Penelope Worsley, the mother of a former volunteer.

After 30 years Salahae continues to lead the work in Thailand, supported by a team of six Karen staff who fully involve the local community to ensure projects promote self-help and sustainability. The Karen Hilltribes Trust' operations in the UK and Thailand are now run by a former volunteer, William Harnden, who has been Chief Executive since April 2013. To date, over £3.5 million has been raised for projects which have helped improve the lives of thousands of Karen people living in Mae Hong Son Province. Over 60,000 Karen people have been provided access to clean drinking water during this time.

The Foundation for the Karen Hilltribes in Thailand (KHTF) was set up in 2002 in Bangkok under Thai law to work in conjunction with KHT to support the projects and its work with the Karen people. KHTF is a subordinate organisation of KHT, according to a memorandum of association which defined the relationship between the two entities. Accounts for KHTF are registered under Thai law and are consolidated into the UK results within these financial statements.

## Objectives and aims

The trust works in partnership with the Karen to support them with projects that lead to self-help and sustainability whilst still retaining their identity and culture. We have three key aims:

Improve health through access to clean water and sanitation

Secure better livelihoods by building irrigation systems and regenerating land.

Increase access to education through the provision of transport, meals and accommodation for children who live too far away from schools, and through university scholarships.

The charity operates in Mae Hong Son, the poorest of Thailand's 76 provinces.

## Public benefit

The charity's aims and achievements are set out within this report. The activities set out in this report have been undertaken to further the charity's charitable purposes for the public benefit. The Trustees have complied with the duty under Section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission and the Trustees have paid due regard to this guidance in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

## Volunteers

In 2016-17, 6 volunteers from the UK travelled to Thailand to teach English and install water systems.

Teaching volunteers spend up to 3 months living with a host family and teaching in local schools. Volunteers working on water systems spend 1 month living and working in a Karen village. All of the volunteers raised funds to cover their costs and made a donation to the charity's projects.

## ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

## Charitable Activities for Financial Year Ending 30 September 2017

The policy of the charity is to focus on three key development objectives: improving community health, increasing access to education and securing better livelihoods for marginalised Thai-Karen, with a geographic focus on northern Thailand. Charitable activities and deliverables for each programming area are summarised below.

## 1. Improving Health

The charity promotes better community health through the delivery of clean water systems, latrine/shower units. The charity also operates a hardship fund that supports families and children with disabilities. The financial year ending 30 September 2017 oversaw the delivery of:

- 6 gravity-fed clean water systems, which provide year-round access to water with dramatically lower levels of pollutants and water-borne diseases. These are expected to help 1,430 beneficiaries for the foreseeable future.
- 3 extensions to current KHT water systems to meet the demand of the growing village population. This benefitted over 1,700 people.
- 276 latrine/shower units, installed across 6 villages. Controlled waste management and better hygiene practices both work alongside clean water systems to reduce pollution levels within nearby water sources and lower the incidence of preventable diseases.
- 7 children benefitted from the KHT hardship fund, including a child with hydrocephalus.

## 2. Secure Better Livelihoods

Karen communities live in isolated environments that are vulnerable to natural hazards such a drought and flooding. At the same time, they are highly dependent on subsistence farming for food supplies and household income. To safeguard crops and fields from natural hazards, the charity has:

- Installed 6 food security systems and directly helped 2,730 beneficiaries across 6 villages. Each of these food security systems also typically benefit up to three surrounding villages, due to the communal usage of Karen farmland. Thus, the expected beneficiaries for this component is 10,920.
- Repaired 2 existing dam sites, as heavy flooding resulted in a need to reinforce the dams with concrete bolsters.

## 3. Increasing Access to Education

The charity implements four projects to help children from isolated and marginalised communities complete their education: school meals, school buses, dormitory construction and higher education scholarships. This year saw the successful delivery of:

- 23 school buses that connect 26 villages to 10 schools across Mae Hong Son. This service allowed 767 Thai-Karen children to continue their schooling during the financial year ending 30 September 2017.
- School meals for 8 schools across Mae Hong Son province, helping to feed 425 Karen students living in dormitories.
- School meals for 29 students from 14 villages who do not live in dormitories. The families of these children cannot afford the school meals and KHT provides direct sponsorship to them.
- Construction of a dormitory at Ban Pho So school to house 60 girls. The dormitory also includes a new washing and toilet block. The school was chosen because the girls were currently having to share beds in another block and it was affecting their education.
- 15 higher education and university scholarships for high-achieving Karen students. Subjects studied range from Primary Teaching to Mechanical Engineering and Public Health. 5 students graduated in August 2017 and KHT accepted 2 new students into the programme in September 2017. Currently, 12 students are receiving a scholarship.
- A new toilet block at Ban Mae Luang school to compliment a dormitory which was funded by KHT in 2010.

In addition to the projects outlined above, KHT distributed 1,016 pairs of shoes and socks to Karen school children thanks to a donation from Tesco Lotus.

## FINANCIAL REVIEW

## Principal funding sources

Income is generated from donations, grants, events and volunteers. Specific major grants have been received from:-

- Aberdeen Charitable Foundation

These Financial Statements reflect the UK generated income of The Karen Hill Tribes Trust. However, as described above, funds are also raised in Thailand which are processed, for operational reasons, through The Foundation for Karen Hilltribes in Thailand.

### Investment policy and objectives

There are no current restrictions on investment. Any investments are held on interest earning deposit at the bank for ease of access and minimal risk of loss.

## Reserves policy

KHT aims to have reserves of six months to cover UK and Thailand running costs. The trustees have mandated the director to build the reserves for KHT to withstand future potential financial stress, in order that the organisation can continue its work should such a situation arise. Free reserves as at 30 September 2017 (unrestricted funds less fixed asset funds) was £43,967 (30 September 2016: £21,922), representing 4 months of fixed costs. The trustees aim to increase this to six months over the next two years.

## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

## Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

## Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Up to 12 trustees are appointed to the board on a 3-year rotational basis. There are currently 2 vacancies. Trustees are recruited by the board of trustees on the basis of nominations from existing trustees. The board of trustees seeks to ensure a mix of skills and selects each trustee according to his/her particular skill or interest.

## Organisational structure

The trustees meet 3 times a year with the key meeting in January. The Director is William Harnden who was appointed Chief Executive on 8 April 2013. It is the Director's responsibility to ensure that the trust achieves its mission through key performance indicators agreed by the trustees.

The UK office is based in York and acts as the fundraising and financial centre of the organisation. The office is staffed by a permanent Fundraising Officer and a Financial Administrator. In support of fundraising activities, we also have a Communications Officer, who is employed on a contract to 31st October 2017. The UK office acts as the coordination point for fundraising activities which take place in the United States, where two trustees are based, and Thailand, where the Director regularly meets with donors and takes them to visit projects. At present, a Programme Officer sits in the UK office to provide support to the Director with reporting, monitoring and evaluation of projects. In line with the organisation's strategy to be community led by Karen staff in Thailand.

The Thailand office is located in Khun Yuam, Mae Hong Son province, where all of the organisation's projects take place. At present the Trust employs 6 staff, all of whom are Thai citizens and ethnically Karen. The staff are project focused, with one Project Manager travelling on a weekly basis to different villages to consult with community members who volunteer their time to construct projects with the support of 4 construction staff. There is only one staff member in Thailand to manage all of the administrative, accounting and project based office work. The office space is inadequate and there is only space for one computer. This year, we moved into a new office space so that the staff have a large space to work in with adequate IT facilities. This office also serves as a base for the director and UK staff when visiting Khun Yuam. Volunteers are also welcome to use this space whilst living in Thailand.

## Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees will be provided with appropriate information and support.

## Related parties

The Foundation for Karen Hilltribes in Thailand (KHTF), was set up in December 2002. Although it is a separate legal entity, KHTF has identical aims as The Karen Hill Tribes Trust. The Karen Hill Tribes Trust organises its operations in Thailand from its base in York, UK. These Financial Statements reflect the UK generated income of The Karen Hill Tribes Trust. However, funds are also donated in Thailand which are processed, for operational reasons, through the KHTF.

## Risk management

The trustees examine the major risks that face the charity each financial year. The charity has developed systems to monitor and control these risks to mitigate any impact they may have on the charity in the future.

## Independent examiner's report to the trustees of The Karen Hill Tribes Trust ('the Company')

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2017

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

### Raising funds

Raising funds includes all expenditure incurred by the charity to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities, events and non-charitable trading.

## Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature to support them.

## Governance costs

Governance costs include costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity.

## Allocation and apportionment of costs

Costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial Activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

## Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

- 20% on reducing balance

Motor vehicles Computer equipment - 25% on reducing balance - 33% on cost

## Stocke

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

## Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

## Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

## Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the operating result.
